RULES

1. The Show includes in its area the whole of the Parishes of Ashwater, Broadwoodwidge, Clawton, Halwill, North Tamerton, St Giles, Tetcott, and Virginstow.
2. All Exhibits must be staged at the Show tent no later than 10.30am on the day of the Show.
3. All entries must reach the Secretary not later than 6pm on the Wednesday prior to the Show, on the entry form attached, accompanied by the entry fee as stated on the Schedule. No exhibit accepted without the proper fee sent with the entry form.
4. Any Exhibitor showing anything not grown in their own allotment or garden shall forfeit all claims to any prize. Any protest must be made to the Secretary in writing before 5.00pm on the Show day, accompanied by a deposit of 15p, such deposit being refunded should the protest be justifiable.
5. No exhibit to be removed before 4.30pm, **but please clear them by 5.00pm.**
6. Exhibitors must provide their own vases, plates, glasses etc.
7. The Committee hold it within their power to inspect the garden of any exhibitor if necessary.
8. The judges' decision in all cases will be final.
9. Only one entry per Exhibitor in each Class.
10. All Cups and Trophies to be returned to the Secretary 3 weeks prior to the Show cleaned.
11. Classes 1-81 are for over 16's only. Classes 82 and 83 for under 5years. Classes 84-90 are for under 12 years only. Classes 91-96 are for 12-16 years only.
12. All exhibits are entered at the owner's risk. **Ashwater Horticultural Society cannot be held responsible for any loss or damage to exhibits.**

FLOWERS

1. Gladioli, any colour, 3 stems
2. Specimen cactus or succulent
3. Vase sweet peas, with any foliage
4. Vase sweet peas, 12 stems any colour
5. Fuchsia in a pot
6. Plant, flowering in pot, fibrous rooted (not a geranium)
7. Plant, flowering in pot, from tuber corm or bulb
8. Foliage plant in pot, not cactus or succulent
9. Geranium, flowering in pot, any colour
10. A single rose, any variety
11. Dahlias, any variety, 3 blooms
12. Dahlias, pom-pom, 3 blooms
13. Dahlias, cactus or semi-cactus, 3 blooms
14. One specimen dahlia
15. One specimen bloom - any variety of flower except dahlia
16. Small vase of annuals (max. 5)
17. Pansies/violas, of any colour in a suitable vase
18. Bowl of garden flowers
19. Miniature garden - rural scene, in a standard seed tray
20. Hydrangeas, 3 cut blooms
21. Arrangement of flowers in a small quirky container
22. Patio container – any shaped container judged on overall appearance
23. Hanging basket (to be staged in the tent)
24. Bowl of roses
25. Mixed vase of flowers, maximum 10 stems, no extra foliage

Classes 26-28 should be approximately 36cm x 36cm (14" x 14") and need not have been grown in your own garden. Pot plants in classes 5-9 should be owned for a minimum of at least six months.

26. Arrangement of foliage only (no flowers)
27. Arrangement to celebrate Ashwater Horticultural Society's 85th Anniversary.
28. Arrangement for Royal Celebrations.

FRUIT

29. Arrangement of home grown fruit
30. Apples, eating, dish of 3
31. Dish of 12 raspberries with stalks and calyces attached
32. Dish of 12 blueberries
33. Rhubarb (3 sticks)

VEGETABLES

Carrots and parsnips must have foliage trimmed back to (7.5cms) 3"

Peas and beans must be displayed with some stalk attached.

Tomatoes must be displayed with calyces (the green flower bud case)

34. Broad beans, 6 pods
35. Runner beans, 6 pods
36. Dwarf beans, 6 pods
37. Beetroot, 3 roots
38. Carrots, long, 3 roots
39. Carrots, any other variety, 3 roots
40. Cabbages, early, 2 heads, suitable for table use rather than size
41. Shallots, 6 bulbs
42. Leeks, 3, washed with trimmed tops, roots intact
43. Marrows, 2
44. Spring (salad) onions, 3 bulbs
45. Onions, 3 bulbs, under 7cms (3") tops tied with raffia
46. Onions, 3 bulbs over 7 cms (3") tops tied with raffia
47. Parsley 6 fronds
48. A collection of 3 culinary herbs displayed in water, (ie a vase)
49. Parsnips, 3 roots
50. Potatoes, white, 4
51. Potatoes, coloured, 4
52. Giant vegetable, any variety
53. Peas, 6 pods
54. Tomatoes, 5 of the same variety (not cherry tomatoes)
55. Cherry tomatoes on the vine
56. Cucumbers, 2
57. 2 chillies (any variety)
58. Any other kind of vegetable not on schedule
59. Collection of vegetables, 5 kinds – 1 of each variety to be shown on a large seed tray (some overflow is allowed)
60. A basket / trug of garden produce judged on the variety, quality and overall decorative look
